Conference Abstract Submission Information

- You must be a current NASPSPA member to submit your abstract. Memberships run from **September 1 to August 31** of the following year. Your membership should be updated by **January 12, 2026**, at the latest to facilitate abstract submission. You can update your membership [here](#).
- **Only data-based papers are eligible for submission.** To qualify, the work must not have been previously published in an archival scientific publication or presented elsewhere at a national or international conference.

Presentation Types

- **Verbal presentations** will be 12 minutes with 3 minutes for questions.
- **Poster presentations** will be printed on paper or similar physical media and displayed on poster boards in a conference meeting room. Specifications for posters can be found [here](#).
- **Symposia** are themed session featuring multiple verbal presentations. NASPSPA encourages interdisciplinary symposia that include presenters from at least two program areas (SEP, MLC, MD) and/or from more than one lab or research group. A typical symposium includes a brief introduction, three speakers, and a discussant or reactor. See below for additional information and the radio button to open the symposium submission portal.

When submitting an abstract, you will have the option of indicating your preference for a verbal or poster presentation. The same reviewing standards apply to all abstracts (verbal, poster, and symposia).

Formatting

1. **Body:** All abstracts have a maximum length of 350 words. Titles and author listings are not included in the word limit. The abstract body cannot include section

headings, the title, or author information. A properly formatted submission is shown in the image below.

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Drawing on tenets of self-objectification theory, women and girls internalize a focus on their body's appearance rather than its functional attributes. Although self-objectification promotes constrained and ineffective motor performance in girls, it is unknown how body awareness and self-objectification impact motor performance in women. The present study examined the impact of body awareness and self-objectification on performance in women. It was hypothesized that greater body awareness would predict reduced performance during a visual-motor aiming task, and this relation would be mediated by self-objectification. Women (N = 80, Mage = 20.6 ± 3.1 years) completed the state Self-Objectification Questionnaire. To prime awareness of the body, participants were assigned athletic clothing to wear for the duration of the study, had their picture taken, weight, height, and waist circumference measured, and completed a body size distortion task. Participants then completed a visual-motor aiming task while sitting beside a full-length mirror. Their behavior was video recorded. For each participant, number of clothing adjustments and self-views in the mirror were coded and summed, and mean body distortion score was calculated. Z-scores were calculated and summed to create a composite body awareness measure (CBA). Mean and standard deviation (SD) of reaction time (RT) were calculated across aiming task trials. Based on the linear regression models, CBA was significantly related to SD of RT ($\beta = 0.006$, CI: 0.002, 0.010, $p = 0.002$), whereby increased CBA predicted increased SD of RT. The indirect effect of self-objectification was $\beta = -0.001$, CI: -0.002, 0.000, $p = 0.054$. These results suggest women's body awareness and perception of their body as an object rather than as an effective instrument may lead to inefficient motor performance. Over time, this relatively inefficient performance could deter participation in physical activity. More work is needed to explore this possible link between body awareness, motor performance and physical activity.
